



ROYAL CORNWALL GAZETTE 31-07-1846

The news of the success of the Cornwall Railway Bill has been received at Lostwithiel with the strongest manifestations of joy and of gratitude to those gentlemen who have directed or in any way aided in procuring for the county this important measure. On Monday morning early guns were fired and the church bells rang as the signal for a general holiday. Many a merry peal was given during the day, whilst bands of music paraded the streets playing lively music to the joyous inhabitants. In the evening there was a dance through the principal streets followed by hundreds of people shouting and cheering. The festivities of the day have rarely been exceeded even in this town so oft in bygone days the scene civic triumph and gaiety.

The Rotary Club of Lostwithiel



Rotary, a familiar name, but who are we? Since 1979 Rotary in Lostwithiel has been making a difference locally and globally. We are not just about making money, far from it, we are also about utilising our time, skills and resources to help others

achieve their targets and needs. There is however an important condition to all of this - we must have fun doing it, and a lot of it. We have very few rules and formalities – so that is who we are. Last month we were involved in the Lostwithiel Carnival Week, in partnership with lots of others. Between us we put together a great week of entertainment and fun. The week is an example of "hands on" Rotary. It isn't about making lots of money, although some is needed to put it all together – it's more about our community. Even so, since 2011 we have been able to distribute over 50 bursaries to our local young people.

Yes, Rotary has lady members (our first joined in 2014). Until recently we helped Bodmin Rotary Club run Bodmin College's Rotary Interact Club with members as young as 14 yrs. Junior Schools can have Rotary Rotakids Clubs, so ages can range from 6 years to well after retirement.

Here in Lostwithiel, the average age when the current members joined was about 47 years, but 9 of them were in their 30s. Some have been in Rotary for more than 40 years. On average we have been in Rotary for half of our adult lives. That is how much we value our membership, what we do and the immense amount of personal satisfaction we get.

Fowey RNLI

On 19 July the coastguard requested the launch of our lifeboat to assess and assist



if necessary, a 16ft motor boat that had broken down on the east side of Fowey Harbour, on the outer edges, where it was drifting onto the rocks. The location was vague as the man on the casualty vessel had phoned a friend who had then called the coastguard. Fowey volunteer crew launched the inshore lifeboat at 3:35pm. As they launched, the coastguard advised that a local boat was on scene assisting. It was agreed with the coastguard that the lifeboat should continue to the casualty, due to the sea state at the location. One of the lifeboat crew was put onto the motor boat and the crew set up a long tow line and brought the casualty vessel back into the harbour where it was handed over to the Fowey Harbour Commissioners' patrol boat.

On Friday 26 July, Falmouth Coastguard requested that Fowey launch the lifeboat to assess a 6.5m speedboat that had broken down between Gribbin Head and Polkerris. The boat was at anchor with four people on board. Fowey's crew launched the inshore lifeboat at 2.25pm. In the interim, an 8m rib had also responded to the Pan Pan VHF message put out by the stranded boat. They had set up a tow and were towing the casualty vessel back towards Fowey Harbour. The lifeboat crew arrived on scene just north of Cannis at 2.35pm and escorted both vessels safely back into the harbour.

On Saturday 27 July at 3.30pm, Falmouth Coastguard requested that Fowey lifeboat station assemble crew, for possible assistance to a woman with a suspected broken ankle, just south of the monument on the Hall Walk at Penleath Point above Fowey Harbour. An ambulance and St Austell and Polruan coastguard teams were en route to the casualty. As there were difficulties with access to the scene, it was decided to launch Fowey's inshore lifeboat to the point and to put RNLI crew members ashore to provide assistance and casualty care. A Fowey Harbour Patrol staff member was already on scene with the casualty. The Fowey lifeboat crew arrived on scene at 4pm, where two crew went ashore and proceeded to provide casualty care and administer pain relief for the woman. The coastguard teams and paramedics arrived on scene at 4.40pm. At 5pm after assessment by the paramedics, it was decided that the best way to evacuate the casualty was to take the woman along the Hall Walk to Bodinnick. With two Fowey lifeboat crew assisting, at 5.30pm the teams took the injured woman from the scene, and at 6.20pm she was transferred to the ambulance waiting at Bodinnick. The inshore lifeboat helm picked up the two crew at the Bodinnick slipway at 6.30pm and returned to the station. This was an excellent example of coordination and cooperation between Fowey RNLI, the coastguard teams the ambulance service and Fowey Harbour patrol.

Fowey crew were paged four times on Thursday 1 August, in an unusually busy day for the station. The D-class was launched at 1:50am to a strange shout, following reports of approximately 20 cows in the water near Chapel Point close to Mevagissey. Fowey's crew arrived on scene to find a herd of cattle in the water and six more on the rock ledge nearby, with two farmers in the water supporting the cattle. Our crew kept their distance and monitored the situation as the farmers in the water guided the cattle back to shore, one by one. Fowey helm James Dowrick said: 'We arrived on scene to see cattle in the water and on the rocks. However, it was clear that the farmers had the situation under control and we supported with torch light and monitored those in the water before returning back to the station, once we were comfortable everyone was safe.'

At around midday, the inshore lifeboat was launched again to assist a mother and daughter who'd got into difficulty whilst paddleboarding off Par Beach. Fowey crew arrived on scene to discover both the mother and daughter were stranded on the rocks to the east side of the beach. The crew successfully rescued the casualties and returned them to the shore. There was also a third page, but this launch was cancelled.

However, the lifeboat was called out again, this time at 5:17pm, after a small boat had drifted approximately 2.5 miles out to sea. 12 • Lostwithielnews September 2024

The crew launched the inshore lifeboat and were able to bring the boat safely back to the harbour. They arrived back in harbour as representatives including lifeboat crews, fundraisers, shop volunteers, press, water safety and branch representatives from the RNLI Fowey community were gathered on the lifeboat pontoon, ready to create an historic photographic record of those involved with the lifesaving charity at 18:24 on 1.8.24 to mark the 200th anniversary of the RNLI which was founded in 1824. No-one was sure whether the crew would make it back in time to be in the photo, but with seconds to spare, as the photographer was preparing to start, the inshore lifeboat sped back to the pontoon, switched off the engine and moored up, just in time for the three crew to turn around and face the photographer, along with all their crew mates and colleagues.

Many congratulations to Christian 'Branch' Philp, who was



presented with his 20 year RNLI Service Medal, by coxswain Jonathan Pritchard.

Our lifeboat week was a great success. We had so much support and commitment from our crew, volunteers and so many people in the wider community. Thank you to all the volunteers who helped to make this week and the Friday event so special, and to everyone who came along to support. We are incredibly lucky to have such a fantastic community in Fowey. Thank you to everyone mentioned below and apologies if we have left anyone out.

The week kicked off with the Polperro Wreckers, who raised £325 for us and continued at the Safe Harbour with an amazing quiz night that raised £510. The fun carried on at the Yacht Club, with Gill Vivian and her team and Paul and his staff running a wonderful evening, with the auction raising £2607, the tombola £200 and sales of over £300 grand draw tickets and £205 of RNLI beer and glasses.



Then it was time for our main event. Our lifeboat volunteers, helped by Fowey Harbour Commissioners, C Toms & Son, Yelland Engineering and Dowrick Electrical, got our upcycled pontoon stage onto Fowey Town Quay, ready for the action. During the build, our crews were called out twice on lifeboat shouts. Lankelly Shout made a guest appearance which kicked off a spectacular Friday evening of music and fireworks. The evening would not have been possible without the generous support of our key event sponsors, Horizon Architectural Glazing who sponsored the firework display and Platinum sponsors, Imerys, C Toms & Son and Fowey Harbour Commissioners. Thank you also to Bristol Private Office Services, Four Turnings Garage, Mor Interiors, Niles Bakery, Richards Fruit and Veg, and also WM Designs who produced the stunning artwork which featured in our exhibition and on all our publicity material for the event. We greatly appreciated the help of the pubs and restaurants on Town Quay for their support leading up to and during the event. Coxswain Jonathan Pritchard said: 'I'd also like to thank the Fowey RNLI 200 committee for all their hard work and dedication over the past few months in putting together such a great week of events.

Thank you to all the committee members, Gary Jane, Boris Watts, Amelia Luck, Will Maher, James Dowrick, Sean McLaughlin, Cathy Baillie, Adam Luck, Chris Ogg, Rob Collings and Di Morris and thank you to everyone who came along to support our events during the week.'

The week continued with lifeboat day on the pontoon and fender racing in the harbour, which is now set to become an annual event! During the day we had a nerve wracking couple of minutes as Luke Grace launched his scale model of Fowey's all-weather Trent for her first ever sea trial in Fowey Harbour. We were also treated to a sail past by sailors from the Yacht Club and Gallants followed by a special RNLI 200 cup which raised funds for us.

The week ended with the final day of our lifeboat exhibition in the Town Hall, which documented 165 years of Fowey lifeboat station, from its origins in Polkerris to the present day. We have had some great feedback about how much people enjoyed it and how informative it was. It was lovely to watch and listen to visitors reminiscing about the people and places featured in the old photos and displays. Thank you to all who came along, and for all the kind comments and corrections!! Thank you also to the Fowey History Group for their help in interviewing crew and to Marcus Lewis, Paul Richards and everyone who helped and sent in photos and information.

We had another great annual Shanty and Beer Festival, thanks to Gill and Graham and the staff at the Safe Harbour for all their hard work.

We're now looking forward to the Lankelly Fowey Rugby Club event at the end of August. Lankelly are hosting a Fowey Lifeboat Invitational XV Rugby match against a local team on Saturday 31 August, The event will feature music, a BBQ, an auction, and a raffle, and all proceeds will go to support Fowey RNLI Lifeboats. We look forward to seeing lots of you there.

Secret project NUMBER 3: Fowey Valley Whisky

With all fine spirits, perfection is just a matter of time. In one year and one day's time we will be opening our doors to Fowey Valley's very own Cornish Whisky.

We've been carefully crafting it for two years and now we have started the countdown to when we are officially able to give you a first glimpse You may already know that you're not allowed to sell whisky until it's been aged for 3 years and a day in wood. Somehow it adds to the excitement we are all feeling about this slowly maturing beauty!

And we have people to thank along the way. We think there's only one Cornish Malt and with help from Simpsons the maltsters and Georgina, the head brewer at St. Austell we secured some of this smooth rare malt and it's called Cornish Gold - one of the main malts in Tribute ale. With more help from our friend Simon, our neighbour at Castle Brewery in Lostwithiel, we brewed a wash and slowly fermented it then distilled it twice on our 500 litre still up to 60% ABV. It went into new 50 litre European Oak barrels, which were made for us in Bulgaria where they had been 'medium-plus' toasted.

On our maturing whisky's second birthday last week we transferred some into barrels that had been ageing our Golden Sipping Rum for two years and we transferred some more into one of our 5 year-old Cider Brandy barrels.

Can't wait to see how they are transformed in a year's time but just to let you know, it is already tasting great!

Colin's Column Update from Cornwall Councillor Colin Martin

We have finally got a footbridge across the railway, which should mean fewer people waiting in the rain or missing their trains. But why has it taken so long and cost so much, and will we ever get the permanent new bridge we were promised?

When I became a Cornwall Councillor seven years ago, I asked the Council to fund a footbridge at the level crossing on Grenville Road, so people wouldn't be forced to wait every time the barriers came down, and commuters wouldn't keep missing their trains because they couldn't get to the right platform.

I was told that a spare bridge in Totnes could be rebuilt here for £250,000-£400,000. I was shocked by the high price, but Cornwall Council agreed to contribute £250,000, if Network Rail would cover the rest. That seemed like a good deal to me (especially as Cornwall Council isn't actually responsible for railway crossings). I am a firm believer in the motto "Don't let the perfect be the enemy of the good", so when someone pointed out that the Totnes bridge wouldn't be suitable for a lift, alarm bells started to ring.

Of course, a bridge with lifts would be best, but that would cost millions of pounds, and it was clear to me that this kind of money simply is not available for small stations like Lostwithiel. I warned that if we started to look for the "perfect" bridge, we might miss out on the "good" bridge.

Sure enough, the decision to go for a bridge which might get lifts added at a later date has ended up leaving the town waiting for seven more years with no bridge at all.

With the general election approaching, Network Rail suddenly found £200,000 to install a "temporary" bridge, though nobody has explained why this wasn't offered to us seven years ago! Network Rail have assured me that funding is definitely in place for the permanent bridge, but the new Labour Government has been cancelling infrastructure projects across the country, blaming their predecessors for making unfunded spending commitments.

Time will tell whether the permanent bridge ever appears, but in the meantime I'm grateful that a "temporary" bridge is now in place. It's not guite where we wanted it, and it's not exactly pretty, but it's better than getting stuck in the rain or missing a train, so I'm very grateful to everyone who has played a part in getting it built.

Meanwhile, I'm told that the spare bridge is still sitting in the car park at Totnes, so if the funding for the new bridge does disappear, we can always go back to Plan A...


